We also take pride in having developed various levels of structure of youth committees that are functional in five districts of mid and far west of Nepal for peace and reconciliation in the past conflict period. Similarly women have their own groups and marching ahead towards socio-economic empowerment and development. Thus, we are focusing our programs on education, economic development, and child rights, indigenous rights, Kanya rehabilitation and health.

As we envision creation of an exploitation free society, we also hope that we will continue to receive kind affection and attention from our well wishers, donors, partners and beneficiaries in the days to come. So, let's redouble our efforts to make this organization more worthwhile, sustaining and enable it to retain its entity intact by all means.

## Introduction

In January 1985, Backward Society Education (BASE) was founded as a pioneering movement (Charapate Club) to fight human exploitation within some of Nepal's poorest communities. Under the leadership of Mr. Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary, a social activist and member of the indigenous Tharu community, a group of 34 youths raised Rs. 735 through cultural shows within the Dang district of Western Nepal during the period of Maghi (Tharu New Year). Since the restoration of democracy in 1990 in Nepal, membership of BASE has grown bigger, boasting a membership of over 196,000 people. BASE's continued commitment to fight social and political discrimination, illiteracy, and poverty of the Tharu people, and other marginalized communities, has inspired a grass-root orientated social movement. Focused within 8 districts in the mid and far western regions of Nepal, BASE aims to bring about a transformation in the outlook of the downtrodden people, as well as those of their oppressors.

The board members of BASE are known as "People-People", while the administrative staff are labeled "Paper-People". They engage in policy and procedure formations along with implementation, fundraising, strategic direction, advocacy, monitoring, evaluation and social and public audits. Although most of the projects are designed by the "Paper-People", this is all following the guidance and research of BASE's "People-People".

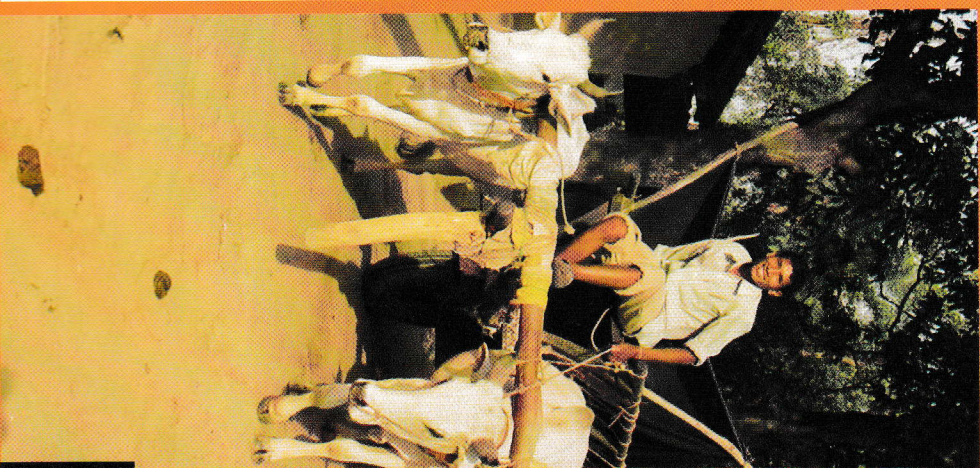
## Vision Mission

- Improve the organizational capacity for its long term sustainability

## Education

**BASE has been implementing formal and non-formal education in 6 districts to contribute to Government of Nepal's slogan "education for all" in coordination with District Education Offices and other line agencies.**



More than 66,000 men and women are literate till 2007 by BASE Education Program.

### Early childhood Development (ECD):

ECD program focuses on physical, cognitive and emotional development of children aged between 3 to 5, through community based child development center (CBCDC). In these centers, Children have access to early learning opportunities through interactive play, music and games. Trained facilitators conduct the classes in child friendly environment. Parenting education sessions are also conducted for parents of ECD children in order to strengthen community participation. Children with ECD experience are more likely to attend and perform well in school than children without ECD experience - 84 % ECD experienced children graduated from grade one to grade two in Kailali district in 2063 BS.

### ECD Makes Ashika Happy

Aashika Devi Chaudhary spent a year in Jan Community Based Child Development Center in Sandepani VDC of Kailali district in western Nepal and goes to a primary school right now. Her mother Laxmi Devi is happy Aashika has learnt to sing and dance in center and is an obedient child. Aashika goes to school regularly and completes her homework everyday. She is also keen to share what she has learnt with her parents. Regular sessions have shown that ECD experienced children are active, inquisitive and less withdrawn than children without ECD experience.

Janahiti community based child development centre was established in December 17, 2006 in Sandepani-9, Belar. It was constructed with Rs. 15,000 financial support of BASE, Kailali. During the initial days of this center, community people used to comment that children at ECD centre only sing and dance and learn very little. But with time, parents and teachers have come to realize that ECD centre provide important initial learning experience to small children which contribute significantly to their physical, cognitive and emotional development. Community now feel ownership towards ECD center and supports its activities. Janahiti center has been able to emerge as a good example of a well-functioning ECD center with the community's commitment, goodwill and genuine support of BASE.



## Basic Education

BASE has been implementing Child Friendly School (CFS) in 61 schools in Kailali. CFS initiative focused mainly on improving physical and psychosocial environment of primary schools by training early grade teachers in active teaching learning method, training school management committee on self-assessment and school improvement plan, building toilets and water facilities, and promoting child protection messages. Its key strategy is to make primary schools child friendly for children to learn.

## Freedom for Child Labour Program

BASE has been conducting this program in its 5 districts namely Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali and Kanchapur with the financial and technical support of Banyan Tree Foundation (BTF). Major goal of this program is to release the child labor from their working places and help them continue their education. Altogether 1041 children (420 boys and 621 girls) directly benefitted from this program

## Education and Awareness to Child Labour

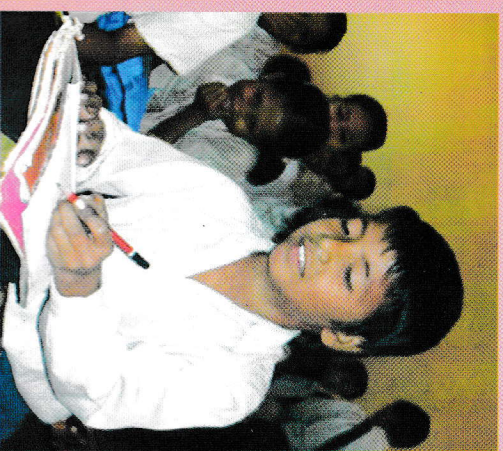
BASE has been conducting this program in Kailali district in partnership with Global Fund for Children. Main goal of this program is to continue education of child labor engaged in various activities. Altogether 54 children (17 boys and 37 girls) directly benefitted from this program. They have received scholarship support, participated in coaching classes, health camps and are involved in various activities of child organization.

## Over Aged Children Class impacting Children

Ten year old Bhim Bahadur participated in overage children class (OACC) Sidhababa Secondary School, Kailali and graduated top of the class. In OACC children like Bhim are taught condensed curriculums that prepare them to enter directly in grade four from grade two. OACC program is Save the Children's effort to place children in more age-appropriate level in school according to their age and quality of education in primary level in Nepal continue to suffer due to overcrowded classes in lower grades. Beside helping children save a year of schooling, OACC also aimed at preventing lower grade classes from becoming overcrowded, thus promoting better learning environment for children. BASE, with support from Save the Children USA, conducted 10 OACC classes, in which 281 children participated.

Bhim's family migrated from a remote far west district of Accham. His father working as a watchman in India and he lives with his mother, and three brothers in a rented house. Despite the family's poor financial condition, his mother encouraged her children to study. Bhim spends most of his time studying and enjoys helping his mother do chores around the house like fetching water and cutting grass for cattle. Bhim, who dreams of becoming a doctor says, "I like to study very much. I spend most of the time in my study. My mother also encourages me to study".

After graduating from OACC, Bhim enrolled in grade four in the same school in the first year and scored good grades in the first terminal examination to secure a second position in his class. His teachers say that he is a very talented kid and works hard in school. Headmaster of his school identified age matching by participating in OACC as one of the reasons behind Bhim doing well in school. The headmaster further added that OACC should be continued as it helps in age matching and to control overcrowding in lower grades. Bhim's teachers see him as one of the bright students with potential to do even better in future.





## Naulo Bihani enables Bina to study Bachelor Level Education

Bina Chaudhary, aged 19 years, who once attended BASE initiated Naulo Bihani Classes funded by Danida, is now studying in B.Ed. first year at Rapti Babai Campus in Tulsipur municipality.

"I am indebted to BASE for having provided me the golden opportunity to attend the Naulo Bihani Classes in my childhood days, but for which I could not have pursued my higher education to this level," says Bina.

Bina is the eldest daughter among her two brothers and one sister in her family. Her parents are Dhamkail Chaudhary and Sriam Chaudhary. Bina had attended the BASE started Naulo Bihani Classes at the age of around 5 at Chakhaura village, Hekuli VDC-8 where she and her parents lived. As soon as she finished this class, she joined Shrigaun High School in the nearby village and finished her School Leaving Certificate Examination in second division. BASE had provided her with school dress and copies, pencils to continue her schooling.

After she passed the SLC, she joined Rapti Vidyia Mandir School at Tulsipur municipality for her Higher Secondary Education for which BASE supported her Rs 40000 for her admission fees. On completion of her 12th standard, she has just joined her bachelor's level first year at Rapti Babai Campus in the same municipality and aspires to continue her higher education in the future if she continues the benefactors.

Interestingly enough Bina had attended her Naulo Bihani classes while her mother Dhamkail Chaudhary had attended the Naya Coreto simultaneously. Her mother was also admitted in class five in the public school and appeared in the SLC examinations along with her daughter Bina. However, she could not succeed to cross the iron bar. All the same she is attempting every year to pass the exam and hopes to do so in the future.

What is worth mentioning here is that before BASE started functioning at Chakhaura village, not a single girls and woman used to go to the schools. Now almost every girl from each house goes to schools. There were nearly 34 bonded laborers in the village at that time who used to work in the landlord's houses. But there are no more bonded laborers nowadays. There is community forest and the village women who are mostly Tharus do not have to go to the jungles to collect the leaves and fodder as they have managed a big community forest in their village. Now there is also a prospect of vegetable farming and market access for sale which was unheard before BASE reached here. The houses were made of thatched roofs whereas now one can find the tiled roofs in the village. BASE has also initiated women's saving credit activities in their groups. They have been mobilizing more than 2.5 million rupees. 16 boys and girls are studying at bachelors level, 22 boys and girls are studying in IA and more than 30 students are going to attend SLC examination this year. Likewise, 3 students have completed AMN and 2 CMA with the scholarship support of BASE. Mr. Purna Chaudhary, Mahatanwa (Community Leader) of the village claimed "It is because of the activities of BASE nowadays there is almost 95% literacy rate in Chakhaura village and income too is increased."

So, the village has made a long stride in the development of its community and village under the active initiation of BASE as of today.

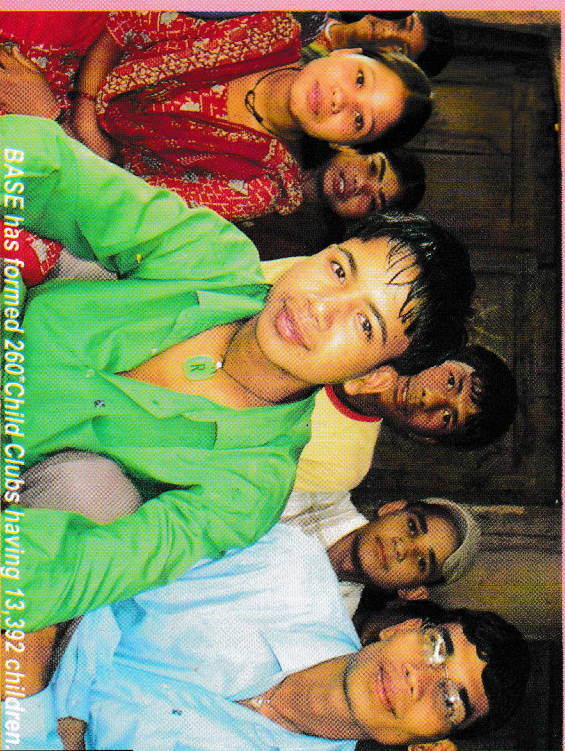
## Adolescent Development

*BASE has been implementing Adolescent development program by formation and mobilization of child networking through children's clubs and organizations throughout the eight districts. It has already established linkage with international child relate organizations such as Global March and Bachpan Bachau Andol (BBA) based in New Delhi.*

*Child members of BASE have participated in various national and international seminars focused on child rights.*

### Child clubs:

BASE has formed a total number of 260 child clubs in 8 districts (Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali, Kanchanpur, Salyan, Rukum and Surkhet). Altogether 13,392 (6,696 boys and 6,696 girls) children participating in child clubs activities through these districts. They perform various activities such as wall magazine publication, raise awareness on child right issues through street drama and different extracurricular activities. Child Club is a platform for children to raise their common voice concerning their education, protection and gender discrimination. Child club perform regular meetings to identify problems and ways to address them in the community.



BASE has formed 260 Child Clubs having 13,392 children.



### Lohadabra Village Youth Club, Dang constructed irrigation cannel

Raising funds and manpower for the construction of this viaduct (shown in the picture) was all organized by the Lohadabra Village Youth Club, independently. However, it was the technical knowledge previously provided by BASE, under Youth Initiative for Peace and Reconciliation (YIPR) program, that enabled them to carry out this project successfully. This project has benefited 150 households. This initiation of the village youth committees testifies that these youth committees are already efficient to implement the community service projects under YIPR project which is being implemented in the second year of project phase.

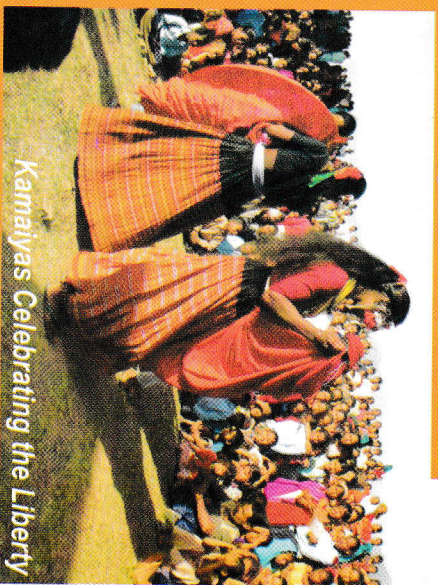
### Neoliterate women extinguished forest fire

**"Hariyo Ban Nepal ko Dhan"** (Green Forest, Nepal's Wealth) this proverb is popular every where but in some societies, No all people plant a tree in their life. People used to collect firewood, timber, valuable medicine as well as to graze cattle in forest. Many people depend on forest products for their livelihood. Most people do not have awareness to preserve green forest. After joining Women's Literacy Classes, women are conscious to protect green forest themselves. Recently, it is proved that on 2004 March, suddenly fire caught Jalandhara Community Forest Mahadevpur-6, Banka. Then, Forest Guard of the forest Site Ram Chaudhary towards the villagers to extinguish the fire. But, nobody listening to the warning he ran to women literacy class for help. Fortunately, women participants of Community Literacy Center response to the forest guard and they all decided to go to extinguish the fire. Finally they all are able to extinguish the fire immediately.





## Case study - Chetram Tharu



Kamaiyas Celebrating the Liberty

I am Chetram Tharu. I was born in Rajapur VDC-1, Bardia. In my childhood my parents used to work as a Kama Suresh Upadhyay's house. When I was 12 years old I asked with my parents, why we do not have land and how My parents used to explain that we do not have any land and home. We are Kamaiyas and landlord has provided us to live. Then we transferred to next landlord's house named Teknath Gyanwail, Daulatpur VDC-2. We worked for 5 years in his house. I started my study in Shree Kaika Lower Secondary School, Chanaura. When I was studying in grade 5 my grandfather died. He died in the month of Bhadra as my grandfather died in the month of Bhadra. E year in the month of Magh there was tradition of replacing new Kamaiyas. So, I had to discontinue my study and start to work as a Kamaiya (bonded labor) in place of my grandfather. After being engaged as a bonded labor I was forced to stop my schooling. I used to involve in fishing, herding cow and wandering with my friends. Again we transferred to new landlord's house. His name was Mr. Dipak Jung Shah, Daulatpur VDC-9. My father worked there for five years. Then he went to India for doing labor work. In 1990 my father migrated to Dhangadhi municipality-4, Uttarbehadi Bardia. At that time I was in Bardia. On 1998 I came to Dhangadhi from Bardia. We did not have any land. So, I started to work in Mr. Bhumaneshwor Pant's house in Krishnapur VDC-1, Bandgaun. On 1999. I left his house.

From 2000 Kamaiya movement was started. During Kamaiya moment I met with landlord Mr. Shivaraj Pant and B representative. Then I met with BASE president Mr. Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary and Mr. Yagya Raj Chaudhary and shared the Kamaiya movement. I shared with him that I am also bonded labour. I have left to work from Mangh. I want to involve in Kamaiya moment. BASE representative also encouraged me to involve in Kamaiya moment. From that point I am involved in Kamaiya movement. After the long way of Kamaiya movement and a huge pressure from national and international organizations the government was forced to declare free to all the bonded labor. On July 2000, government declared free the kamaiya. I also got 3 katha lands in Dhangadhi municipality along with several Ex Kamaiyas. Similarly in the second phase the government distributed 2 katha lands to those Kamaiyas who were left getting the land in the first phase. In the free declaration the government announced to rehabilitate the ex-bonded labor. However government has not implemented it was committed in the past. So we are still continuing kamaiya movement.

### *Rupmati is leading now...*

Rupmati a member of Milian Child Club, had a hard time for convincing her parents about the concept and importance of the child club. Her parents were not happy with her involvement with the club as they didn't approve of boys and girls working together in the club and considered the club was a waste of time. She lives in Kotatusipur, Kailali along with her 9 family members. Her mother passed away few years back. The family earns its livelihood by farming, in which Rupmati also involved and hardly earn US\$ 1 per day.

17 yrs old Rupmati is now studying in grade 10 in Kotatusipur where BASE, Kailali has implemented Child Friendly School (CFS) program funded by Save the Children. Under the CFS program, BASE has provided Active Teaching Learning Methodology (ATLM) training to teachers. School Management Committee (SMC) training, preparation for School Improvement Plan (SIP), assisted in forming Child Right Protection Group and also provided basic furniture.

Rupmati has been actively involved with Milian child club for last four years. She was one of the three members of Milian child club who received ADARSH interaction facilitation training. They are now conducting ADARSH interaction session for child club members twice a month. Furthermore, Rupmati is involved in various club activities such as performing street drama, publication of a wall magazine, tree plantation, generating awareness against early marriage, keeping the streets clean and upkeep of the roads. She also involve in protection of community forestry. She along with other club members has caught neighboring villagers who come to steal timbers and other natural resources from the forest. They warn them against felling trees and inform them about the importance of forest resource.

Rupmati recalls, 'In the past, I could not speak with newcomers and was unable to share my problems and feelings even with my parents. Now I can talk openly to them and share my problems and experiences with my friends as well.' Her family is happy to see Rupmati's behavior change after being part of the child club. Seeing the performance of the child club and the positive impact it has had on Rupmati, her father not only supports her involvement in the club but also encourages other parents to send their children to the child club.

## **Economic Development**

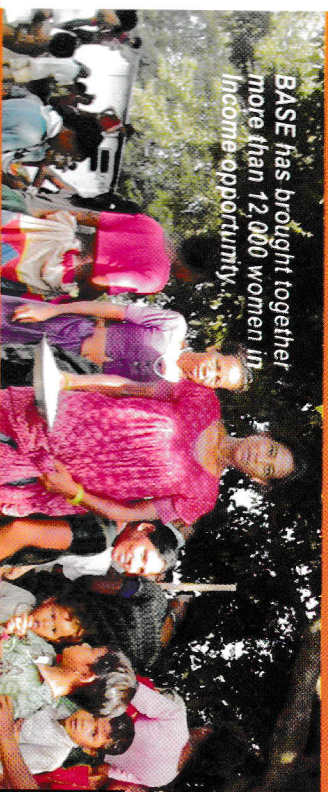
BASE has been implementing various economic services for its beneficiaries in Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali, Kanchanpur and Salya districts. These services generally are related to income generation activities in freed Kamaiya Women's Groups and other marginalized groups through capacity building, vocational training and IGP support.

### **Livelihood Program**

BASE's livelihood program provides vocational training and focuses on agriculture based income generation program for out of school adolescents, freed Kamaiya families and conflict affected families. Dang, Banke, Rukum, Bardia, Kailali and Salya. This program aims to make them self-reliant and able to generate their income independently. Most of whom belong to economically poor families. This program being implemented with the financial and technical support of Save the Children US and International Development Enterprises.

This year 220 households benefited from fish farming program, 506 from vegetable farming, 723 from goat rearing, 54 from floriculture, and 52 from banana farming and 169 adolescents received vocational skill development training. Similarly, 115 conflict-affected families are benefiting from income generation support.

**BASE has brought together more than 12,000 women in income opportunity.**





## ***Training generated self employment...***



Ram Bahadur Bista lives in Munuwa-9, Motinagar, Kailali. In an outer appearance he looks like a rich person. However, he belongs to simple farmer background. The family has 12 Katha land and there are 5 members in the family. Ram Bahadur started professional agriculture farming for the last two years, when BASE started to implement IGP program in his community. He received support from BASE for pond construction and vegetable farming. He is doing fish farming in a pond and vegetable farming around the dike of the pond. He is doing banana farming in 4 Katha land. This year he has earned more than Rs. 26000.00 from agriculture farming. He said "agriculture farming has supported me for livelihood, education and medical treatment of my family". He further said that credit of his progress goes to his own laborious work and continues support received from BASE.

## ***Sher Bahadur Chaudhary***

My name is Sher Bahadur Chaudhary and I live at Geta VDC-7, Stree Lanka in a Kamaiya camp Kailali. I belong to a poor family. We didn't have any land some time ago but now we have 5 katha land for our family's survival. However, we have a big family so the land is not sufficient to sustain our family needs. Without any skill, it is difficult to support my family for livelihood.

### **Before:**

In the past, our family worked as bonded labor (Kamaiya) in the landlord's house and due to this situation I never went to school. I was forced to unwanted jobs. Sometimes I went to India to earn for my livelihood. As a result I couldn't get any education and further skill development.

### **After :**

Ever since BASE started the PLA classes, I received an opportunity to join this class to learn something. Slowly I learned letters and numbers. Also learnt about vegetable farming, goat raising, banana farming and other micro enterprises. After some time BASE started the hair cutting training for adolescents. I took this training and decided to start up a haircutting center in my own village market. After two months training, I opened my hair cutting center at village market in Machhapokhari Bazar at Geta. Now I earn Rs.200 to Rs.400 rupees per day. I am satisfied with my work as it is running successfully.

I have full support of my family in my profession. I am saving some money every day for future. At last, I hope that this type of training will be given to other people like me who do not have opportunity to go to school and acquire skill. I am grateful to BASE for this pioneering project.





## Nepal Women's Poverty Alleviation Project (WPAP)

BASE implemented Nepal Women's Poverty Alleviation Project (NWPAP) in partnership with ADRA Nepal has started ameliorating the lives of hundreds of women in the Mid-Western districts of Banke and Dang in the last three years. NWPAP has been improving the quality of life of these underprivileged and previously illiterate women through various activities. The NWPAP specially focuses on improving literacy levels, improving opportunities to engage in vocational livelihood activities, improving sanitation and natural resources management skills and laying the foundation of micro-credit schemes. This project in the long run has empowered women to change their lives for the better. Now with skills in writing and calculation, these women can easily form and participate in the saving and credit groups and they are now managing book keeping, loan distribution and repayment. Furthermore, this project also has significant impact at the community level in rural as well as urban areas.

## Income Generation changed our fortune

BASE, Kailali has been implementing Income generation program in Lathaiya ex-kamaiya sib Ward #5, Chaumala VDC of Kailai district since 2005 AD. Altogether there are 44 household and the population of the sib is 210. In the past people of that village used to depend on labour work for livelihood and did not do agricultural farming. They had very low income and did not send their children in school.

Under income generation program, BASE has supported 4 water supply borings, 3 tread pumps for vegetable farming and 6 hand pump for drinking water. Similarly BASE also provide vegetable cultivation, Insect pest management banana cultivation and diseases and pest management training. BASE supported 130 banana sakkari and vegetable seeds in the camp. BASE has been conducting regular supervision and technical support for agricultural farming. Government has provided 5 katha land to each household. After getting the support they started the vegetable and banana farming in the land. In an average per household income is Rs 6200.00 in a season. Now, the children of the ex-kamaiya family are attending in Early Childhood Development centre and school. Community people say "We are satisfied doing agricultural work and our economic condition is also improving. So we would like to thank BASE and request to continue such program".



# Health

**Keeping the concept of Healthy mind in healthy body BASE has also given priority to health activities in its program. BASE has also created community health clinics, outreach mobile clinics, and further health programs centered on nutrition, public health, saving newborn lives and family planning.**

## School Health and Nutrition (SHN):

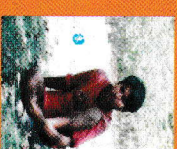


BASE has been implementing SHN program in Kailali district since 2002. The objective of the program is to improve health and nutritional status of school age children leading to improved school performance. Under this program BASE provides 2 doses of de-worm tablets and a yearly dose of iron tablets to school children, builds toilets and drinking water facilities in schools, trains students and school management on health and sanitation, conduct screening, vision and dental and

distribute disposal pit. This year a total of 43,604 children (21509 boys and 22095 girls) received de-worm (Albendazole) tablets and 34531 (16993 boys and 17538 girls) received complete course of iron tablets.

## Health Program improved Man Bahadur's study

Backward Society Education (BASE), Kailali has been implementing School Health and Nutrition (SHN) Program in Kailali since 2002. It has been implementing in 137 schools of 14 VDCs in Kailali district in this fiscal year 2007. De-worming and Iron tablet distribution is one of the major interventions of the program.



Man Bahadur B.K. is studying in Shree Janjagrity Lower Secondary School, Jhili, Chaumala, Kailali. There are altogether seven members in Man Bahadur's family. He belongs to poor family. SHN program is being implemented in this school since 2004. Focal teacher Jagatram Chaudhary and Headmaster Hark Bahadur Budha told that there is a drastic change in health status of Man Bahadur B.K. as compared to the past before implementing SHN program in the School. Previously, Man Bahadur was physically very weak. He was lean and thin, used to vomit in class and complain the problem of stomach pain. He was anemic and poor in study. He did not like to participate in extra curricular activities and used to sleep at school hour. His face and nail looks whitish.

When he started taking de-worming medicine and iron tablet, there is improvement in his health status. Now, his face looks glowing. There is no problem of stomachache and vomiting, improvement in his study and participates in extracurricular activities. He is regularly taking iron tablet. Focal teacher Jagat

Chaudhary said "Iron and de-worm table distribution, toilet construct, health education session and other activities of SHN program has supported a lot to improve the health and education status of students of the school. Man Bahadur is one example. He had failed in last year exam. But this year he has passed the exam with good marks." Man Bahadur's friends Sita Sarki and Samjhana B.K. also expressed the changes in Man Bahadur. Man Bahadur's father Bhole B.K. and mother Amrita B.K. are very happy to see changes in his son. They would like to thank BASE and suggest for continuing the health program.



## Peace Building

*BASE has been closely involved in peace building efforts in areas affected by conflict in mid and far western Nepal even during the time of Maoist insurgency and in the post conflict period as well.*

### UJYALO

Over 12,000 people lost their lives in the decade long Maoist insurgency in Nepal. The insurgency resulted in displacement of thousands of families and traumatized many. For such victims of conflict, BASE has been implementing UJYALO program in Kailali. Dang and Salyan districts in partnership with Save the Children USA. UJYALO focuses on promoting peace in communities through psychosocial, educational, peace building and economic opportunities. Children affected by conflict received educational support, including clothing and fee, psychosocial counseling services to individuals and psychosocial support through Sanjeevani class which have helped traumatized children to return to normalcy while effective parenting class help parents in this process. UJYALO benefited more than 16000 people during the reporting period.

### Child Protection

This child protection program was funded by Swedish International Cooperation development Agency (SIDA). BASE implemented this program in Kailali district in partnership with Save the Children USA. The objective of this program is the return and reintegration of children formerly associated with armed forces and armed groups (CAAFAG). Its major components are reintegration of former CAAFAG; promotion of community based child protection system; tracking and responding to the need of lost children and legal aid and protection awareness campaign. A total number of 127 (69 male and 58 female) child protection committee were trained and have identified 51 former CAAFAG children and 31 other vulnerable children (OVC) in their community and linked them with basic education services like education support to 35 (18 boys and 17 girls) and income generation training to 34 (17 boys and 17 girls).



**Counseling service recovered Roshan**

Roshan (Changed name) Masuriya VDC, Kailali is a 14 year old child and studying in grade 8. He lives along with his mother and elder brother. His elder brother is 16 years old and studying in grade 10. His grand parents lives along with his uncle. His uncle lives separately. His uncle lives along with wife and children. Four years ago Roshan's father was died due to typhoid disease. One day when Roshan was returning home from school, he was encountered with security force carrying weapon and he felt fear. Since that time, he has abandoned school. Occasionally, when he goes to school, he becomes faint in class. So, he did not attend school for two months. There was increasing in the frequency of his faint problem. He became faint up to 4 times a day. He did medical treatment in Seti Zonal hospital in Dhangadhi. Doctor referred him to treatment outside Dhangadhi. His uncle was planning to take him in Lucknow, India for medical treatment. Community level psychosocial worker knew about his problem. They took him to counselor of BASE, Kailali. He became faint many times in the initial stage of psychosocial counseling session. Firstly counselor took him session along with his mother, and then they took the session separately. Counselor took session following the counseling process. He has recovered now and attending in school. There is no repetition of faint problem. His uncle said "My nephew is completely recovered, he has started to attend school. He further said "I would like to thank BASE because it has recovered my nephew."



### Kriyasil Club Keeps Mobilizing Youths

Soon after Mercy Corps partnered with BASE and launched Youth Initiative for Peace and Reconciliation (YIPR) project funded by USAID in the mid and far west regions, **Kriyasil Tharu Samaj**, a village level youth club located at Banke, Kohalpur-6 emerged out as one of the successful youth clubs among the 820 other clubs that has started working in accordance with the objectives underlined by the project for peace and reconciliation. This club under the active leadership of Fulram Chaudhary has succeeded in mobilizing idle and gossiping youths (between 16 to 30 years of age) to implement the community development activities by exploiting local resources and collecting resources from other local NGOs and INGOs. The club as taken a lead in initiating HIV/AIDS related preventive measures side by side with other development activities. As an outcome the youths are now resilient to non-violent activities as compared to the immediate past. For now and for sure the youths are hopeful about their future. They can go to schools, colleges and universities in violent free society. No more gloomy clouds hover around them. Needless to say the credit for making this success story goes to the tremendous efforts put in by Mercy Corps and BASE that conceived this project themes set transparent objectives and set forth to achieve them with considerable commitment, sincerity and dedication.



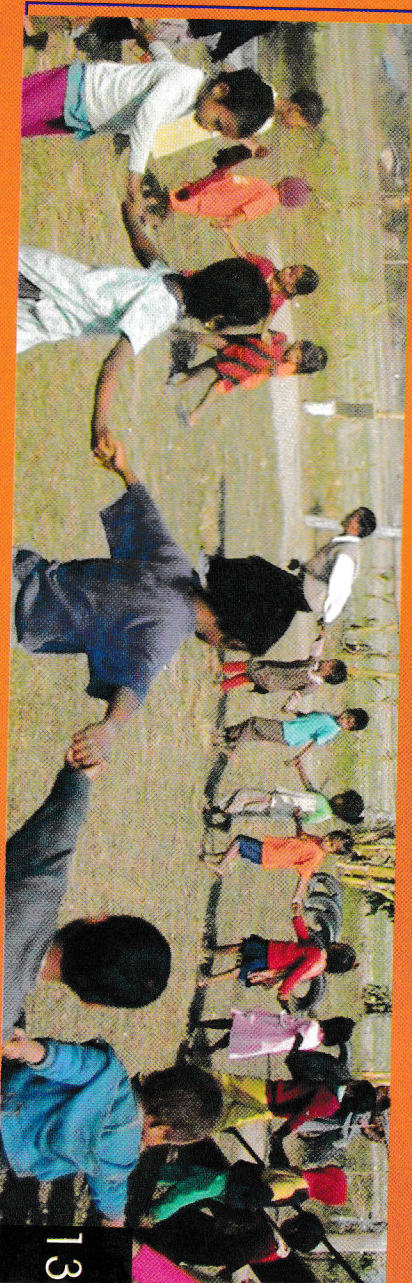

### Partnerships for Protecting Children in Armed Conflict (PPCC)

PPCC is a network of national and international organization that works in Nepal to ensure children and schools as "zone of peace". It regularly monitors the cases and trends pertinent to violence of child rights to education. The network of national partners for PPCC includes Advocacy Forum Nepal, Backward Society Education, Community Study and Welfare Centre, (CSWC), Concern for Children and Environment-Nepal (CONCERN) and Himalayan Human Rights Monitors (HimRights). The international partners are Save the Children USA and CARE Nepal. PPCC concerns itself in systematic documentation of attacks on schools and child rights to education by the warring parties during conflict time. It also documents reports related to threats issued against teachers and students for forceful abductions for conscription. PPCC has also enhanced the capacity of grassroots, civil society organizations in Dang and Surkhet district by providing them financial and technical support to effectively collect information, use this information strategically to protect children's security and rights and to work as linkage between the local organizations and international policy making bodies. Altogether 805 people are benefited from this program.

### Building Peace and Democracy through Education (BPDE)

BASE is implementing this program in Kailali district in partnership with Save the Children USA. The aim of the program is to strengthen the capacity of community people for reducing conflict and restoring peace. BASE has promoted peace in communities through peace building, child club and Child Protection Committee (CPC) strengthening and mobilization. Altogether 1619 people (848 male and 771 female) directly benefited from this program.





## Youth Initiative for Peace and Reconciliation

Considering that the youths have been the most vulnerable group during the decade-long armed insurgency in Nepal, Mercy Corps in close partnership with BASE initiated "Youth Initiative for Peace and Reconciliation" (YIPR) project in five districts of mid and far western Nepal i.e. Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali and Kanchanpur since October 2006.

Over 30,000 youths hailing from different communities including marginalized communities across five districts through (one central committee, 5 district committees, 21 area committee and 820 village youth committees) are being mobilized under this project to enable them to promote peace and reconciliation through various non-violent activities such as holding camps, organizing street dramas, organizing parent-youth interactions, sports competitions and peace promotion competitions. Scores of youths under this project have been empowered as they continue to enhance their capacity development by undergoing peace mediating training.

The large part of this project focuses on delivering community service projects (CSP) in all 820 village youth clubs with some specific emphasis on income generation activities such as goat raising, vegetable farming, nursery plantation, piglet, fisheries. All these youth activities ultimately contribute to peace and reconciliation in the society that has gone through the ordeal of abominable violence, intimidation, extortion and forced conscription. Steadily, the youths of these five districts are learning how to lead the war torn multi-ethnic community towards a peaceful and harmonious nation replete with prosperity and progress in the days to come. Altogether 24722 youth are directly benefited from this program.

### Peace Building

BASE conducted peace building program in Kanchanpur district with the financial and technical support of The Asia Foundation. The objective of the program was to build peace and harmony among community people by strengthening the capacity of traditional leaders such as Bhamansa, Mahauto, Badghar and Guruwa. Altogether 3966 people benefited directly and 5000 benefited indirectly from this program.



## Coalition of Constitutional Assembly Support (CoCA)

Coalition of Constituent Assembly support project has been implemented by BASE in collaboration with Pro-Public Dang and Kanchanpur districts. The main objective of project is to create coalition for the upcoming Constituent Assembly (CA) election in Nepal through civic and voter education. Under this program 8154 people have been trained. The issues of social inclusion of women marginalized communities in the forthcoming CA election have been addressed in the program. The program is focused on the need to make the civil society aware about the results of the second phase of people's movement for democracy which overthrew the direct rule of the King. Now a great number of rural people also know about the process of CA elections.

### Life and Livelihood

BASE has been conducting Jiwan Ra Jiwika and bring future program in Dang, Bardia, Kanchanpur and Saptari districts in partnership with World Education. The objective of the program is mitigation of conflict through scholars non-formal education and alternative classes. More than 2000 people benefited by this intervention



## Environment Protection

*Over the last two decades, BASE has been working to conserve the environment through reforestation projects and the protection of natural resources. These programs and various others have been implemented through environmental education, multi-purpose nursery management and community forestry development.*

### **Forest protection and conservation**

Realizing that unless and until the marginalized class such as indigenous women, Dalits and janajatis have access to decision making bodies with their effective equal participation, there will be no improvement in the living status of the poor and marginalized people. Therefore, with this notion, BASE in close partnership with Livelihood Forest Program/DFID have jointly initiated "Forest Protection and Conservation Program" in Rukum districts under which the remote VDCs and conflict torn areas are incorporated to involve in the community forestry whereby the income of the forest commuters are increased through livelihood programs. Altogether 1950 people are directly benefited from this program.



## Organizational Development

BASE has had a unique structure for its organizational development right from time of its inception. Since it is a mass membership based organization, its organizational development approach runs parallel with the development interventions. From the beginning BASE has been making efforts to improve internal resources along with the mobilization of external resources. By this time BASE has improved its financial, administrative and organizational structure procedures. BASE being an Intermediary Support Organization, it has stressed its organizational development along with organizational development of partner organizations. In this connection BASE in partnership with Save Children USA has been implementing SANDEEP program with an aim to enhance the service delivery capacity of local NGOs related to delivery of health, education and economic opportunity services in the conflict affected areas. The project includes particular modules on governance, leadership, strategic planning, management of finance, resource mobilization, human resource management, operational management and linkages. BASE has 8 local partner NGOs which institutional capacity development has been prioritized under this program.

### **Implemented Activities of BASE with its own Resources**

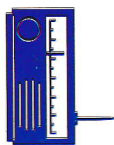
BASE has been mobilizing internal as well as external funds for development communities through its various programs. Especially, external resource mobilized in development sector while internal resource is mobilized in office management and organizational development. Some major activities being implemented with the internal fund of BASE are capacity building of committee members and staffs; organize general assembly of central, district, village, regional and committee levels. Furthermore, mobilization of civil, women and youth organizations, advocacy for freed Kamaiya rehabilitation, peace rally, peace building, project proposal writing and books and cassettes are also carried out by its internal funds.

The main resources of BASE internal fund are membership fees, staff contributions, and program organization charge such as exposure visit, training workshop etc.



## Information and communication

Information and communication are powerful tools to create awareness and change towards positive behavior.



BASE has also realized its importance and given priority to it. "Jutyalha" program is broadcasting twice a week from Radio Bageshwory FM, Nepalgunj in Tharu language. Similarly "Jutyalha" wall magazine is published quarterly. BASE has launched its organizational website [www.basenepal.org](http://www.basenepal.org) to update and inform about project activities.

BASE also publishes its organizational bulletin known as "Sanghari" bimonthly, covering news and events of BASE.

## Disaster Responses

BASE in partnership with Save the Children USA has been operating Disaster Preparedness and Response programs in Dang, Salyan and Rukum. Under this program disaster preparedness network is formed and direct support is provided to disaster victims, including victims of conflict and natural and man made disaster. This program is design in such a way that BASE is equipped to immediately help other program district in case of disaster. This year the program supported 7023 victim of disaster families, the support included food and non-food items.

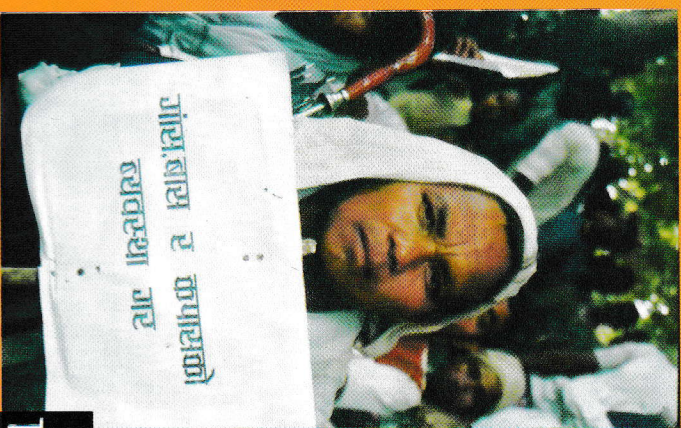


## Human Rights and Advocacy

Without advocacy and awareness of human rights, the marginalized communities be solving one problem today only to face a new problem tomorrow. However, in order to achieve this legal standing, these groups need technical and organizational skills along with further support. BASE specially focuses its advocacy and human rights campaign for resettlement of freed Kamaiyas, reduction of child labors, and overall social inclusion and mainstreaming of marginalized communities through, community mobilization and development activities frequently.

### Freed Kamaiya movement for rehabilitation

Every year freed Kamaiyas observe Strawn 2 as their freedom day. However, this year they observed it as a "black day" in protest against governments' indifference towards their settlement and rehabilitation issues being raised by them for over six years. This year around 150 freed Kamaiyas from Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali and Kanchanpur carried their domestic ploughs, utensils to stage a sit-in in front of Singhdarba Kathmandu the same day. A week long movement in Kathmandu was led by BASE President Mr. Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary and their struggle committee Chairperson Mr. Sundra Tharu. The police men and freed Kamaiya movement members had several scuffles during demonstrations. Police had arrested Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary and other freed Kamaiya demonstrators repeatedly. Many demonstrators were injured during the scuffle. Later an agreement was signed between the freed Kamaiya Movement delegation team led by Mr. Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary, Sundra Chaudhary and Land Reform Minister Mr. Jagat Bogati. The government assured the freed Kamaiya delegation that it would rehabilitate the freed kamaiyas of Dang, Banke, Bardia, Kailali and Kanchanpur within a year.





## Oppressed People's Assembly

From February 17 to 19, 2007, BASE organized "Oppressed People's Assembly" in Nepalgunji with a view to bring together more than 50,000 people including youths, children, women and adults representing various committees of BASE working districts.

The massive rally was addressed by various national and international dignitaries like BASE President Mr. Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary, Mr Kailash Satyarthi of Bachapan Bachau Andolan (India),

indigenous people's intellectuals such as Dr. Krishna Bhattachan and other youth leaders. Former Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba was the chief guest on the occasion, while several other donor representatives were also present.

The Assembly focused on raising people's common voice for peaceful change, conflict transformation and overall social inclusion of all the marginalized communities in the changed political context and in the upcoming CA election and formulation of the new constitution. The assembly also witnessed hundreds of Tharus and other ethnic cultural glimpses with overwhelming participation of youths, children, women and adults alike.

Dilli Bahadur Chaudhary and Kailash Satyarthi advocating for child rights and calling upon the people to end the child labor system. Around 150 Children from Nepal, India and Bangladesh were involved in the cross boarder march team. They also performed street dramas, songs and dances at Nepalgunji. This boarder march succeeded in making parents and those who exploit children realize that child labor should be immediately stopped and they have committed themselves to pave the way for the children's right to education.
